What are New Mexico's criteria?




For the commission; codified criteria that also apply to the legislature are *starred. Legislature could add more.

Required	Permitted	Prohibited
 *One person, one vote *Complying with the VRA *Compactness *Contiguity Preserve communities of interest 	Consider political and geographic boundaries Preserve the cores of prior districts	 Splitting precincts Diluting minority voting strength *Race being the predominant factor in a district's construction Consideration of partisan data (except for VRA compliance) Considering incumbent addresses, except to avoid pairing incumbents

Votes Needed to Pass Maps

Simple- or supermajority?



Commission + Legislature

How does the relationship work in NM?



Multiple Stakeholders

Governor, Legislature, Commissioners, Community Orgs, Industry, Etc.

Which kinds of data are used in redistricting?

Unlike the legislature, the commission can't look at election data



Redistricting data from the Census Bureau AKA the "P.L. 94-171" 2

Other data files

Political data for VRA compliance, data on communities of interest Estimates/Projections?

To prepare while awaiting redistricting data and to understand future trends



What is the public's role?

There are many ways to give input



Draw a Map

Speak at a Meeting

Draw your community of A interest (or a whole map) and submit it for consideration

At a public hearing, tell your story and what your priorities are

Submit Written Comments

Submit written testimony through online portals or email

How to analyze a map?



- Split cities/towns/counties
- $\circ\,$ Split communities of interest
- Number of incumbents paired, by party
- \circ Political outcomes of maps
 - Sampling and outlier analyses
 - Statistical tests
- Dr. Duchin is an expert in all of these!

Questions to Ask When Reporting a Story




- How are members of the legislative committee or commission selected?
- Will census delays cause New Mexico to miss deadlines? See NCSL's <u>census delays and redistricting</u>.
- Are New Mexico's criteria considered in priority order or "holistically"?
- Does New Mexico have areas where the commission and/or legislature will be required to draw minority opportunity districts under the Voting Rights Act?
- How much communication and cooperation do you expect between the commission and the legislature?

- What is New Mexico's history with litigation?
- New Mexico has a portal for map submissions online.
 How will that system be managed?
- What is the political landscape? See NCSL's <u>partisan</u> <u>composition</u>.
- How are communities of interest reconciled against other criteria?
- In New Mexico, the legislature's majorities aren't big enough to override a possible veto. How likely is it the governor would veto new maps passed by the legislature?
